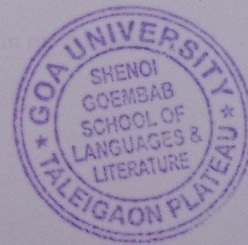
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ABSTRACT

Valued at over \$3.5 billion, everyone wants to claim this vast treasure, but its location has remained a mystery—until now.

From the beginning of book one - *The Hunters* - we see how Chris Kuzneski describes the Russian criminal, building up the tension in the narrative.

“Vladimir Kozlov had built a criminal empire in Moscow. He dabbled in everything from drugs and weapons to prostitution and smuggling. In recent years, he had discovered the advantages of cybercrime, though he rarely used computers himself. Through it all, he had managed to avoid prosecution. Thanks to the liberal free-trade laws established after the fall of the Soviet Union and, more importantly, millions of dollars in bribes to key officials, Kozlov was viewed by most Russians - the same people that he secretly robbed, and threatened, and extorted - as a national hero. But to the FBI, he was something else. He was a person of interest. Possibly the most interesting man in New York”

The beginning of this chapter starts with a thrill and ends with a cliffhanger “*He hoped a long stroll would calm his nerves. Instead, it put his life in danger.*” (Kuzneski, “*Hunters*” 20) Here the reader can see how the author ends chapter one on a cliffhanger keeping the reader engaged for the following chapter while maintaining the thrill in the narrative. One can also notice how the main characters are not introduced until chapter two, where he calls one of the main characters as ‘intruder’ while describing her instead of giving out her name.

Initially in chapter three we see how the author gives a plot twist “*She entered the house and immediately froze in place.*”(Kuzneski, “*Hunters*” 24) Since she broke into a house one may think she froze because she got caught by a guard or something bad was about to happen to her but when one reads the following lines “*Her surprise had nothing to do with alarms or warnings. It had to do with the striking difference*

between the exterior of the house and its lavish interior.”(Kuzneski, “Hunters” 24) The reader can see how the author uses a method of plot twist, where he creates thrill and makes the readers think that she is in potential danger whereas in reality it's just that she's amazed by the interior. The ending of this chapter also has a cliffhanger- *“In a flash, she realized it wasn't a room at all. It was a walk-in meat locker”*(Kuzneski, “Hunters” 27) the author here does not describe what kind of a meat locker Sarah enters, keeping it a secret until the next chapter.

Chapter eight again ends with a suspense *“He had no idea who he was looking for, but he hoped someone would stand out. Unfortunately, that someone turned out to be him”*(Kuzneski, “Hunters” 47)

There are also alternate changes in the settings, for example, in the first chapter the author describes Vladimir Kozlov who had built a criminal empire in Moscow but had a ‘clean’ criminal record. It also describes how the FBI are after him in a surveillance van outside his house whereas chapter two skips to the intruder trying to invade the house which again changes in chapter five where the author focuses on Hector Garcia. Changing settings is normal in writing but here, Chris Kuzneski describes all these places during the same time. He lets the readers know what is happening in different locations during the same time while keeping up with the surprise element.

Here is another example of how Chris Kuzneski weaves thriller into a historical narrative:

“Thinking quickly, the gunman leaped over a railing in the open mezzanine and tried to catch her before she reached the back deck. He fired once, barely missing her right shoulder but hitting the French doors in front of her... Hoping

to find the intruder's blood on his carpet, Kozlov saw nothing but broken glass. Disappointed, he raced to the balcony where he expected to see two crumpled bodies on the pool deck below. Instead, he saw something that sickened him to his very core: the gunman was helping the intruder out of the pool. It took a moment for it to all sink in. The two of them were working together. Kozlov's face turned red as he roared, 'Kill them both!' ” (Kuzneski, *"Hunters"* 39-40)

The stakes here are raised with each passing moment as the gunman takes aim, his shots narrowly missing their mark and shattering the tranquility of the scene. The reader is kept engaged as Kozlov reacts to the unfolding chaos, his hopes dashed as he discovers the unexpected alliance between the intruder and the gunman. The revelation that the two of them are working together adds a twist to the narrative, deepening the intrigue and leaving Kozlov reeling with shock and disbelief. “It was as if he had been transported to 1916 and was standing in the macabre quiet of the Crimson Drawing Room of the Alexander Palace - the preferred home of Nicholas II and his family. A gilded chandelier hung from the ceiling. Marble columns braced heavily draped walls. The chairs were richly upholstered in crimson cloth. The carpet was deep and crimson. The walls were covered with the same sort of emerald wallpaper that had adorned the royal home.” (Kuzneski, *"Hunters"* 187) The passage evokes a vivid historical scene, transporting the reader back to 1916, a time of opulence and grandeur, with a specific reference to the Alexander Palace, the preferred residence of Nicholas II, the last Tsar of Russia, and his family. Overall, the passage sets the scene

of a lavish and stately room, transporting the reader to a bygone era of aristocratic splendor and royal opulence.

Most of these treasures are not fictional, in fact all of them exist in real life and all are stolen just as mentioned in the book. In this realm, truth mingles with myth, inviting the reader to join the hunt for answers amidst the captivating blend of human creativity and the enduring impact of art. The Hunters set out on a journey where stolen artifacts reveal profound insights, and where the pursuit of knowledge sheds light on the remarkable resilience of cultural heritage in the face of challenges.

1. Portrait of a young man - painted by Raphael in 1513

During World War II, Raphael's "Portrait of a Young Man," along with other notable artworks such as Leonardo's "Lady with an Ermine" and Rembrandt's "Landscape with the Good Samaritan," vanished after being taken from the Princes Czartoryski Museum in Kraków, Poland, by the Nazis. Initially concealed in an outbuilding in Sieniawa, all three paintings were uncovered by the Nazis just two weeks later. Following this, they adorned Hans Frank's residence in Krakow before being moved to Berlin and Dresden, eventually intended for Adolf Hitler's collection in Linz. While Leonardo and Rembrandt's artworks were later transported to Hans Frank's headquarters in Sichów, the whereabouts of Raphael's masterpiece remain uncertain, as its presence was not confirmed in subsequent reports.

2. The Battle of Anghiari - painted by Leonardo da Vinci in 1505.

The Battle of Anghiari, a painting by Leonardo da Vinci from 1505, is currently lost, earning it the nickname "The Lost Leonardo." Some believe it may still be concealed beneath later frescoes in the Palazzo Vecchio, Florence, specifically in the Salone dei Cinquecento. The central scene depicted a fierce battle for a standard at the Battle of Anghiari in 1440, featuring four men atop raging war horses. Although the painting itself is missing, numerous preparatory studies by Leonardo survive. The composition of the central section is best known through a drawing by Peter Paul Rubens, titled "The Battle of the Standard," dating back to 1603. This drawing was based on an engraving from 1553 by Lorenzo Zacchia, which may have been taken

directly from the painting or derived from a cartoon by Leonardo. Rubens skillfully captured the intensity and emotion of the original painting, drawing parallels between the Battle of Anghiari and his own work, the Hippopotamus and Crocodile Hunt, painted in 1616.

3. Portrait of Alfonso I d'Este - painted by Titian in 1523

The Portrait of Alfonso I d'Este, a painting by Titian from 1523, is now lost but was once celebrated for its portrayal of the Duke of Ferrara. Paired with the Portrait of Laura Dianti, his lover, the painting depicted Alfonso with one hand on a cannon and the other on his sword, symbolizing his military prowess during a tense period in his relations with the papacy. Copies of the original exist, including one by Rubens and another held at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York. Dosso Dossi's later portrait of the duke drew inspiration from Titian's work. Vasari and Michelangelo praised the original painting, which was later acquired by Charles V, Holy Roman Emperor. Although it was housed in Bologna and then Spain, it disappeared during the 18th century after being mentioned in inventories of the Royal Alcazar of Madrid.

4. The Storm on the Sea of Galilee - painted by Rembrandt in 1633

The Storm on the Sea of Galilee is the sole seascape painted by Rembrandt van Rijn, depicting Jesus calming the stormy waters of the Sea of Galilee. Completed in 1633, it was housed in the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum in Boston, Massachusetts, before being stolen on March 18, 1990. The theft, orchestrated by two individuals

disguised as police officers, remains the largest art theft in American history. Alongside twelve other works, the painting was stolen and has yet to be recovered. Despite the FBI's knowledge of the perpetrators announced in 2013, no arrests have been made, and the investigation remains ongoing. The empty frames of the stolen artworks still hang in the museum, awaiting their return.

5. The 20 lei gold coin of 1868

“ *The gold twenty-lei coin was issued in 1868. Less than five hundred were minted, so this is a rarity.*’... *As expected, the left profile of Carol I appeared on the front. The inscription read: CAROL I DOMNULU ROMANILORU. In English, it meant: Carol the First, Prince of the Romanians.*” (Kuzneski, *Hunters* 100) The 20 lei gold coin of 1868, struck in limited numbers, is considered one of the rarest numismatic treasures, valued at approximately \$5,000 to \$10,000. Prince Carol I of Romania gifted these coins to European royalty, political leaders, and relatives upon ascending to the throne. Although it never entered circulation, its significance as the first golden coin of modern Romania is unparalleled. Legend suggests that some coins may have been buried at the foundation of Peleş Castle in Sinaia, built years later in 1873. In 2005, the National Bank of Romania issued a near-identical golden replica of the original coin, marked with the letter "R" to denote its replica status. The coin bears the inscription "Carol I Prince of the Romanians," reflecting Romania's aspiration to unify all Romanian territories. The orthography on the coin, utilizing the short final "u" at the end of words, reflects historical linguistic conventions, later standardized by the Romanian Academy in the early 20th century.

4.1.2 ANALYSIS OF THE MENTIONED ARTIFACTS: *THE FORBIDDEN TOMB*

1. The tomb of Alexander the Great

“ ‘Upon his death, Alexander was placed inside a coffin of hammered gold. It was then placed inside a magnificent funerary hearse that was nearly twenty feet tall.’
... ‘A vaulted ceiling made of gold and precious stones was supported by a row of solid gold columns. Gold molding adorned the tops of the walls, and intricate gold figures decorated each corner. According to legend, the hearse was lined with a collection of golden bells to announce Alexander’s arrival.’(Kuzneski, “*Forbidden Tomb*” 33)

The tomb of Alexander the Great is one of the most famous mysteries of all time. The ancient world’s most brilliant military commander and conqueror passed away at the age of 32 from suspicious causes in 323 BC. After Alexander’s sudden demise, his body was mummified and kept in a golden casket . The mummified remnants were interned in Memphis but were later moved to Alexandria, the city founded and named after Alexander. Ptolemy I Soter, one of Alexander’s top general, was designated head of Egypt. Accordingly, the location of Alexander’s actual tomb has been termed as one of the greatest unparalleled mysteries of all time.

In the heart of ancient Alexandria, a city steeped in history and grandeur, lies a mystery as old as time itself—the tomb of Alexander the Great. Legend has it that after Alexander's untimely demise in Babylon, his loyal general Ptolemy sought to honor him with a mausoleum fit for a deity. Thus, the Soma was born—a majestic monument envisioned to rival the pyramids in its splendor.

Yet, despite its intended grandeur, the Soma's exact location remains elusive. Some historians suggest it may have stood near the modern-day Mosque of Nebi

All she had to do was maintain enough side-to-side pressure with her arms and legs to support her bodyweight while she crawled vertically toward the roof.*” (Kuzneski, “Hunters” 37) Another would be when Sarah had to recover the 20 gold lei coin from Dobrev’s apartment “*Anyone who happened to be looking up at the side of the building as Sarah made her way down would have been forced to choose between two, equally unlikely scenarios: Catwoman exists, or the laws of gravity had changed*” (Kuzneski, “Hunters” 119) Since it was one of the important clues as well as something dear to Dobrev, Sarah rescued the coin before the police reached the crime scene using all her might.

According to their team leader, Cobb, she has the ability to hide her true self by disguise. “*On the beach, she had been a fearless woman. Here, she resembled a lost teenager. The difference was truly remarkable.*” (Kuzneski, “Hunters” 56)

However, her internal struggle with morality adds depth, as she grapples with her past and seeks redemption. As her relationships with teammates evolve, so does her trust and loyalty.

Through her journey, Sarah transforms from a solitary figure to a vital part of the team, in the beginning the reader can see her as someone who does mingle with the

team members but stays aloof, keeping an unapproachable look for example in the section below “*Sarah stared at Jasmine from across the table. The intensity of her glare said it all. If you call me ‘thief’, I’ll come up with something even worse.*” (Kuzneski, “*Hunters*” 70) This changes over time in *The Forbidden Tomb* after Jasmine’s death, we see how Sarah becomes adamant about taking revenge for her teammate and her friend’s death even when her own life was at risk.

“Contrary to McNutt’s concerns, Cobb knew this wasn’t about Sarah losing control. This was about reclaiming it. Two of her friends had died a few minutes apart, and she had been unable to save either. Although she couldn’t bring them back to life, she could even the score by killing the people that she held responsible for their deaths. She had already killed Kamal, and now she wanted to kill the rest. And he wasn’t going to stop her.” (Kuzneski, “*Forbidden Tomb*” 405-406)

She did all of it while contributing to their teams successes and striving for redemption beyond personal gain.

“During the past year, she had learned a lot about herself. She used to prefer to work alone, but now the isolation of it was less thrilling. After working with a team of highly skilled experts on a pair of high-stakes missions, she had discovered the value of teamwork. She is more like the team's personal history book as she answers all the questions about history in a split second.

Throughout the first two books of the trilogy, Jasmine's historical knowledge proves instrumental in unraveling clues related to legendary treasures. She adeptly bridges the gap between ancient mysteries and modern challenges, ensuring the team's

progress and success in their quests. While others in the team rely on physical prowess, such as combat skills or thievery, Jasmine's strength lies in her intellect. Just to keep her safe Cobb, their team leader, makes her learn self defence

“Cobb looked at Jasmine. She was the team member he knew the least about. ‘Quick question: if I were to punch you in the face, what would you do?’ She shrugged. ‘Probably cry.’ He laughed. ‘That’s what I figured. There’s no doubting your skills as a historian - you’ve just demonstrated them. But I need to be sure that you can take care of yourself in the field. Starting early tomorrow morning, I want you to learn the rudiments of self-defense. Preferably judo or jiu-jitsu.’” (Kuzneski, *"Hunters"* 90)

This was one of the main character developments she had after joining the team. After going to the battlefield Jasmine starts thinking herself as a liability to the team as she is not courageous enough. This changes after a while when she decides to look out for herself instead of being in her own personal space “ *It had taken a while, but Jasmine had decided to stop thinking of herself as a liability. That was a major step in her growth*” (Kuzneski, *"Hunters"* 153)

In *The Hunters* Jasmine is introduced as a historian with guarded secrets, driven by her passion for uncovering the past. However, her interactions with the team reveal vulnerabilities beneath her scholarly facade, hinting at deeper layers to her character. One of the major changes she went through with other characters is with Sarah Ellis. They had a small bickering among themselves and stopped communicating for a while, this changed when Sarah got attacked and needed rest under her watch, Jasmine had to take care of her being the only female in the group along with Sarah which made

them grow fonder of each other. Even when they roasted each other later, they did not take it as seriously as before.

“A few months earlier, she had been timid and vulnerable, but after surviving multiple attacks in the field she had emerged with a new level of confidence.” (Kuzneski, *“Forbidden Tomb”* 28) As the series progresses, particularly in *The Forbidden Tomb* as seen above, Jasmine's expertise shines brightly as they embark on the hunt for Alexander the Great's tomb. Her growth involves stepping out of the safety of books and archives, embracing risks and challenges with courage and determination. Unfortunately her character is sacrificed at the end of *The Forbidden Tomb* *“The elder raised the sword above his head, said a few words in his native tongue, then brought the blade down with all of his might. The last sound that Jasmine ever heard was the snap of her neck. A moment later, her head rolled across the floor.”* (Kuzneski, *“The Forbidden Tomb”* 391) She is killed by one of the elders, who apparently took care of the tomb whom they regarded as their god. Jasmine was killed while trying to calm the elder down which was making him more angrier and in the end resulted in her death.

5.1.7 MAGGIE LIU

Maggie is one of the main characters introduced in the last book of the trilogy. After Jasmine's demise, Papineau found a replacement in the team with someone who was intelligent as well as physically strong *“The focus of the room shifted to Maggie, who didn't flinch in the whitehot glare of the spotlight. Instead, she remained composed and confident; two traits that Jasmine lacked when she had first joined the team.”* (Kuzneski, *“Prisoner's Gold”* 40)

“She’s worked in China as an elite tour guide for nearly two decades, which is a much greater undertaking than it may seem. More than handing out maps and reciting trivia, her position demanded an encyclopedic knowledge of anything and everything about the region. She has an extensive knowledge of Chinese and Asian history, speaks a dozen languages fluently, and has an academic knowledge of two dozen more lingua francas.’... ‘Miss Liu is also accomplished at wing chun, one of the more mysterious Chinese martial arts.’... ‘In addition to competitive-level wing chun, I’ve also studied tai chi and kung fu since I was a small girl. That came in handy when dealing with some of my freespirited clients. I needed to protect them when we went into dangerous areas along our way.’ ” (Kuzneski, *“Prisoner’s Gold”* 42)

Their team work is commendable from the very beginning, we can also see another example when McNutt tells his other teammates—who were yet to be an official

team-to leave the place while the russian thugs were after them while risking his own life “ ‘Just get to the water!’ McNutt shouted. ‘Let me worry about the show of force. You guys just turn and run.’ Neither Cobb nor Sarah moved. McNutt kept shouting. ‘Do it now, or I’ll shoot you myself!’ ”(Kuzneski, *”Hunters”* 50). In the later half we see how Cobb and Sarah refuse to leave him alone until McNutt starts yelling at them to leave the spot keeping up with their behaviour of working as a whole team.

At the end of *The Forbidden Tomb* one can see how despite McNutt's unconventional behavior, the team unanimously supports his proposal, demonstrating their unwavering trust in his abilities. “*Not surprisingly, the vote was quick and unanimous: all in favor of the scheme. Despite his wacky ways, they knew McNutt was a first-rate soldier who wouldn’t let them down. If he promised that he could protect the team, then they damn well believed it.*” (Kuzneski, *”Forbidden Tomb”* 415) The quick and unanimous vote suggests a deep-seated belief in McNutt's reliability and competence as a soldier. Their faith in his promise to protect the team reflects a strong bond forged through shared experiences and mutual respect.
